Nick and Amanda's world turned upside-down when their bright and beautiful daughter, Laura, was killed in a rampage shooting by a man with severe and persistent mental illness. Feeling compelled to dedicate themselves to the goal of reducing violence, Nick and Amanda began advocating for improved mental healthcare and death penalty repeal. "Laura's Law", which allows for court ordered assisted outpatient treatment for persons with severe and persistent mental illness, was named after their precious daughter and enacted in California in 2002.
